Trout Stocking on March 4th

Eagle Project to Repair the Lake Pier

Peter DeRose from Boy Scout Troop 1094 will be repairing the Lake Pier for his Eagle Scout project. He will be replacing rotting boards, rusting hardware, and repainting the pier. The project will take place on Saturday, March 26 from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm and Sunday March 27 from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm. The pier will be unavailable for use these two days. Rain dates for the project will be April 2nd and 3rd.

March Speaker Focus

Built in the 18th and 19th centuries, Jerusalem Mill Village, located in Kingsville, Maryland, is one of the oldest, most intact mill villages in the country. The village is being preserved and restored by the Friends of Jerusalem Mill, an all-volunteer, non-profit charitable organization. The mission of the organization also includes preserving and protecting the trails along the Little Gunpowder Falls.



Rich Albright is a retired Senior Executive from the Department of Defense. He started volunteering in the village in 2014, primarily maintaining 24 miles of trails in the Central Area of the Little Gunpowder Falls State Park, while researching the history of the area. In 2018 he was appointed Curator for the village, and in 2019 joined the Board of Directors and was elected as Treasurer. Rich continues to serve as Curator and Treasurer today.

Rich's presentation will introduce you to the history of the Jerusalem Mill Village, and the importance of preserving the structures and the memories of the people who lived and worked in the village. He'll also talk about their program of educating the public through "living history", and the many events that are available (the majority of which are free to the public).

Woodie Wrap-up

Just a few weeks ago, we wrapped up another successful season of the Chapter's Wood Duck Conservation Program. Thanks to a great group of volunteers, the Chapter's 73 wood duck nesting boxes are ready for this spring's upcoming nesting season. Twenty-two volunteers logged over 120 hours in January and early February as they braved the frozen swamps to monitor last year's nesting activity, prepare the boxes for this spring, make repairs, and even clear a few problem trees.

The 2021 nesting season, which we recorded during our outings this winter in 2022, was a successful year. There was nesting activity in 45 of the 73 boxes (62%), which is within the historical average of 60-65% and an improvement over the past five-year average of 56%. The wood duck team recorded evidence of 193 hatchlings out of 309 total eggs. The 62% hatching success rate is again an improvement over the past five-year average of 57%. Whether you have participated in the wood duck outings or not, this is a conservation success story that every Chapter member should be proud of.

As the Chapter's long-time wood duck coordinator Ryck Lydecker would say, a tip o' the Camo Cap to all of our volunteers for all of your hard work and dedication. It was great to see some new faces out there, as well as the veterans, and I hope that you all had as much fun as I did. See you out there next year!
