A Season of Setbacks, a Day of Discovery

This year was one of the most challenging I've experienced since taking over the Rockville Chapter's Save Our Streams (SOS) program in June 2021—just before my daughter, Flora, was born. Now four, she's developed a strong interest (and a bit of jealousy) in my SOS work, often annoyed that I'm off teaching other kids about fish and bugs without her. I'd looked forward all year to bringing her to her first SOS event—but weather had other plans. Heavy rains triggered cancellations of our May and July stream samplings.

Thankfully, on Sunday, September 21, 2025, we finally held our first (and only) stream sampling of 2025. A modest group of nine adults and five kids gathered at the Jim Berrier Memorial Lake Pavilion, and the small turnout made for a hands-on, memorable day at Great Seneca Creek.



Wading into the water, the kids explored the world of benthic macroinvertebrates—small aquatic creatures that tell us a lot about stream health. Over the past five years, this section of our creek has consistently rated between fair and good in water quality. It's a beautiful stretch, with riffles, moderate current, and a healthy riparian buffer, though some erosion exists.

A Season (continued)

While our triannual samples usually yield a variety of positive indicators—like mayflies, stoneflies, and riffle beetles—this year we collected just fifty-seven aquatic insects from two eighty-second samples. It was our lowest count in years. Conservation Director Cindy Stevens noted the likely reason: many bugs had already hatched earlier in the season.

We did find a few pollution-sensitive species like mayflies, along with more pollution-tolerant aquatic worms, suggesting a mixed picture of stream health—acceptable, but possibly declining.

Still, the kids had a blast discovering dragonfly larvae, a rare damselfly, and giant hellgrammites—alien-like predators that were a hit as they crawled across tiny arms. Even with a low bug count, the learning and laughter were abundant.

We'll be back next season, nets in hand—and hopefully, Flora by my side.

Keeping Up on Salt Monitoring

The Izaak Walton League of America Rockville (IWLAR) Chapter is actively monitoring water quality at two important sites: Seneca Creek Stream and the Lake. As part of the Salt Watch program, volunteers regularly collect water samples to measure chloride levels, which reflect road salt pollution. This year we also initiated Nitrate Watch to track nitrate concentrations, addressing concerns about fertilizer and stormwater runoff impacts.

Monitoring results at the Lake have been consistently favorable for both chloride and nitrate, indicating minimal negative influence from surrounding land use. In contrast, Salt and Nitrate levels in the Seneca Creek Stream fluctuate throughout the year, influenced by seasonal changes and human activities such as road salting and agricultural runoff.
